

THE LEADERSHIP STYLE OF JAMES: He lead with Humility

The Leadership style of James

INTRO: Love that the Bible exposes us to a variety of different leadership styles but with consistent leadership values

PERSONAL: Found myself comparing my leadership bias to that of the extroverted, self confident, sit-on-the-front-row team members, and feeling second best

- then realized that God can use a variety of leadership styles
- So styles are different but leadership values are the same

Want to study the leadership style of James and **how he expressed** some of the leadership values we have studied before

The Leadership Style of James

1. He led with HUMILITY

And this humility was expressed in a very practical way.

Here is how he introduces himself:

James 1:1 (NIV)1 James, a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ,

To the twelve tribes scattered among the nations:

Greetings.

This is the blood brother of Jesus and senior pastor of the Jerusalem church

- Notice that there is no title of Apostle, Senior Pastor or Brother of Jesus
- In fact no titles at all not even "Servant of God James" but rather "James, a servant of God"

You see titles and positions exult the leader above the people they lead

- the humble leader wants to close the gap
- So take a look at how he speaks to the people

Example from just a few verses:

James 5:7 (NIV) "Be patient, then, brothers and sisters ..."

James 5:9 (NIV) "Don't grumble against one another, brothers and sisters ..."

James 5:10 (NIV) "Brothers and sisters, as an example of patience ..."

James 5:12 (NIV) "Above all, my brothers and sisters, do not swear ..."

James closed the gap by constantly referring to the people as "brothers and sisters"

- 13 times in 5 chapters!
- He didn't refer to Jesus as his brother
- He spoke to the people as his brothers and sisters

Eg. Had a pastor blame the people for his big title and seat on the stage

- "They want to show respect by giving me these exulted titles and positions"
- James fought against this and expressed humility by intentionally closing the gap between himself and the people he was leading and not allowing it to grow

WHY

James was a leader of **great wisdom**, something we will study more in the next few episodes.

• And one of the conclusions that his wisdom brought him to is expressed here:

James 3:13 (NIV) 13 Who is wise and understanding among you? Let them show it by their good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom.

BIG IDEA: The sign of true wisdom is in fact humility.

Here is why:

After seeing Jesus' humility and seeing his death, resurrection and ascension first hand he had come to a powerful conviction:

James 4:10 (NIV)10 Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up.

This was not just a nice quote but a practical leadership value James lived by.

 He was convinced that when we lead with humility and not self promotion, God will promote.

BIG IDEA: God promotes genuinely humble leaders

Why genuine?

- False humility is another form of pride "I'm not really that good. I'm not worthy of the praise" the focus is still me
- Insecurity can sound like humility "I could never be the one to do this" focus is still me
- Fear can masquerade as humility "No, that is too big for me to step into" focus is still me

Humility is shifting the focus entirely onto the Lord

- James was convinced that God's grace flows towards humility and against pride
- In fact the place of genuine humility becomes a weapon against the enemy

James 4:6-7 (NIV) ⁶ But he gives us more grace. That is why Scripture says: "God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble." Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you.

It was this radical belief in the power of humility that anchored his leadership

BIG IDEA: God's grace and favor flow towards the humble leader

CHALLENGE:

Have you yet come to the revelation of how powerful humility is?

- if not then ask God to give you this revelation
- Without this revelation your fleshly nature will try and self exult
